Introduction

- All News is Fake News (not your news or my news)
- There are two silos of news, left and right.
 Almost none in the middle, and certainly none that are "not biased."
- News is biased, know the bias
- Bias in NOT an indication of fake news
- Hat tip to Scott Adams, many of the items here are from his podcast "Coffee With Scott Adams"

Types of "Fake News"

- Human Error reporter is not an expert in the topic of the article, they get stuff wrong.
 - See also "Gell-Mann Amnesia"
- Incomplete ideas or quotes that transmit a inaccurate or deceptive meaning
- Repeating unverified quotes or statements as fact
- Mind Reading is never valid
 - "The hypochondriac knows he's not sick" is mind reading
- Outright fabrications

More Types of "Fake News"

- Reporting the worst case scenario as the main plan
 - e.g. a politician wants to cut fraud from Social Security, it's reported as deliberately cutting social security benefits for seniors.
- Reporting a fact using a false notion
 - e.g. not raising taxes keeps things the same, it does not "reduce taxes for the wealthy"
- Reporting obviously suspicious reports as true without vetting them
 - e.g. the Russia Collusion Hoax was based on an easily vetted fictional dossier

Gell-Mann Amnesia

- An expert in a specific field reads a news article in that same field and finds many gross errors
- That same expert reads the next news article and receives it as accurate
- Truth: Journalists have limited knowledge of many topics, their news articles are always filled with errors.
 - This is a fact when you work with humans
 - Will it be worse with AI? We'll find out soon enough

List of ways to Spot Fake News

- Anonymous source always fake news
- **Deceptive edits**. Cut the comment short to reverse it's meaning.
 - e.g. the Fine People Hoax
- The "prison of two ideas"
 - An issue is presented as A vs B
 - But the truth is never A or B, it's usually something totally different from another direction.
- The statement is **against common sense**.
 - i.e. so outlandish that it does not hold up to the "really" test.
 - Really? Really?! Really? no.
 - e.g. The President did not tell you to drink bleach.

Narratives

- The political information distribution complex is a distributor of narratives, and not facts. - Scott Jennings CNN, 12/12/24, 12:16pm
- Trump was the "breaker of narratives"- Scott Jennings, CNN
- My analysis: That "distribution complex" includes news, but is far more than the news. It includes politicians, podcasters, commentators, government organizations including intelligence orgs, prosecutors, etc.
- Some news tells "a story" not "the story"

The Fog of War

- Don't believe anything during the fog of war. (S Adams)
 - When an incident is new or active, there is often contradicting reports.
 - They can be a mix of right, wrong, close, misinterpreted, incomplete, out of context
- Don't believe anything in the first 24-48 hours after a huge event. (D Bongino)
- Don't believe anything coming out of a real war. Both sides have self serving interests to spin the story their way.

Thoughts on Credibility

- Vet the credibility of all the news sources you use.
- Correlate the stories across different sources watch for the "wrap up smear"
- If FoxNews and CNN both report a story the same way, it has more credibility.
- If only one side reports a story and the other ignores it either the story is fake or the other side is pretending it's fake.
- A number without a percent, or a percent without the number is a sign of fake news
 - 50% of two *million* is one million and 50% of 4 is 2
 - Because the scope of the problem or the risk cannot be determined.

The Wrap Up Smear Nancy Peloci's Technique

- A technique to "merchandise" a negative news story.
- Leak a negative story to a media news maker (like the New York Times)
- Other outlets pick up the story and publish it
- Quote one of the news outlets to "validate" the story you leaked in the first place.
- Let Nancy Pelosi explain it to you
 - Search YouTube or Rumble for "Nancy Pelosi wrap up smear"

The Documentary Effect

- A Documentary has 90 minutes or more to persuade you of something.
- Documentary writers are very good at their craft
- A Documentary would be boring if it was not persuasive.
- Watch out for the "documentary effect"
 - Documentaries could be written to persuade you of one side of an issue.
 - I'm told (I didn't confirm it) that a documentary exists that will convince you that Michael Jackson was a pedofile. I am told there is another documentary that will convince you he absolutely was not a pedofile.

A Technique: The Kraken

- "The Kraken" is a maneuver where an intelligence agent or other adversary tells a prominent person that there is a nefarious root cause of a problem. And it is about to be revealed. The root cause is outlandish and false with the intent of making someone look silly and ruining their reputation.
- Example #1: the 2020 kraken indicating "proof" of election fraud. It was a false story to ruin the lawyer's reputation. This is where the term originated
- Example #2: Iranian mothership launching drones over New Jersey in December of 2024. There were indeed drones over NJ, but the mothership story sounds like a ploy to make the congressman look dumb.

The Trump Caricature

- The left bias news paints a picture of Trump that is not accurate.
- It describes a caricature of Trump, not the actual person.
 - Trump is not a racist, he is no threat to democracy, he's no where near a "Hitler" figure. He is not dumb. He is a superb diplomat. He is a great communicator. He does not lie like the New York Times wants you to believe.
- Tyrus said "Trump had a lot more minorities vote for him in 2024 compared to past republicans simply because they listened to the candidate."
 - Compare that to listening to the fake news caricature of Trump.
- Who else is portrayed as a caricature? (AOC and others)

Additional thoughts and topics

- A fun hobby: enjoy spotting fake news in your favorite and most trusted news sources.
- A last minute evil story drop is a likely indicator of fake news. (Friday evening, Holidays, election eve)
 - e.g. Kavanaugh, Hegseth
- Malicious Compliance: When someone pretends to obey a rule but they are really trying to subvert it.

Carefully Chosen Words

- Carefully chosen words are a sign of fake news
 - "No undercover FBI agents in the capitol on Jan 6"
 - Yet we know from official FBI statements that several Confidential Informants were indeed inside the restricted zone and inside the capitol.
- Choose a word that excludes important aspects.
 - Agents vs Assets
- Look for carefully chosen or overly specific words

Too "On the Nose"

- If a story is "too on the nose" then it's probably fake news.
- A report that makes a claim that sounds perfectly credible to activists on one side
- i.e. a report that political activist does exactly what their adversary would expect them to do.

Models can be Fake News

- Models are fake news most of the time
- Have a conversation about models with any engineer to verify this slide
- In a nutshell, models can simulate small or limited things with great precision.
- The bigger the system, the less accurate. Very large systems cannot be modeled accurately at all. It would likely get direction right-ish, but not magnitude.
- Example, weather forecasts
 - Tomorrow's weather forecast is near perfect
 - three day forecast is pretty good and 10 day forecast is close, but often adjusted
 - 1 year out is the Farmer's Almanac, eerily close-looking but not accurate.
- Models are only as good as the weighting assumptions in the algorithm.
